
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As a Council we are mindful of the threat COVID-19 poses to our town and residents. Information and strategies are rapidly changing, so we encourage you to visit the Alberta Health Services or Government of Canada websites for the most current information regarding how to protect yourself and others. We are also updating our website and Facebook pages regularly. As a Town, we are following the advice of Alberta Health Services and we encourage you to do the same.

Raymond Council wants you to know that we are here for you. We are finding ways to support you and your business through this crisis. At the April 7, 2020 Council meeting, Council waived penalties on EVERY property tax, utility bill (water/sewer/garbage) and other bills owed to the Town until December 31, 2020. Covid-19 has also impacted access to our golf course, playgrounds and recreation facilities. As of now, the province has closed all of these facilities. The 2020 Southern Alberta Summer Games has also been cancelled. Council is discussing the option to host the 2022 or 2023 games but this has not yet been decided. By May 5th, council is planning to determine the status of Heritage Days (July 1st), Aquatic Centre and other summer activities. There have been several bylaw changes over the last few months that are aimed at beautifying our community. Here are two that might impact you.


Bylaw 968-10, Care of Boulevards and Lanes – Restrictions have been placed to prevent parking on boulevards. People who are currently parking on the boulevard, and have made improvements to the parking area, will be permitted to continue parking there, provided they complete an application with the town's Development Officer. People who continue to park on the boulevard without approval will be contacted by the Peace Officers to either complete the application with the Town, or to cease parking on the boulevard. Please contact the town Development office if you have any questions.

Bylaw 1048-17, Dangerous and Unsightly

There Property were several _ amendments to this bylaw. The most significant change, however, is that people are now limited to two derelict or unregistered vehicles and those vehicles must be in the back yard. For many, compliance to this provision will be a significant undertaking. Council is prepared to give homeowners time to remedy their properties. Please contact the Peace

Knight Residence Designation



Town Council passed third reading of the Knight Residence Bylaw (1078-19) in December 2019. Bylaw 1078-19 designates the former Knight residence as a Municipal Historic Resource. This designation process is the culmination of several years of work by the Town's Historic Resource Committee to preserve Raymond's history.

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The Knight residence is the second property in town to receive this designation; the Museum (former Town Hall) was previously designated through Bylaw 1077-19.

Council Committee News

All of our Town Councillors sit on several committees that the Town has deemed of interest or priority. Here are a few updates.

Raymond Wellness Coalition -- In 2019, the Town of Raymond joined the Alberta Healthy Communities Initiative (AHCI). This group is comprised of members of the public, Town Admin and Council. The group will apply a research based/best practices approach to enhance the physical, social and emotional health of our community.

Stampede Transition Committee --

The Stampede Transition Committee's mandate is to develop recommendations for council regarding the relocation of the Stampede Grounds and the redevelopment of the fairgrounds. The committee is made up of members of the Ag Society, Stampede Group and Town Council. **Community Engagement Committee** – The Community Engagement Committee is an ad hoc committee that is comprised of members from Council and the public. This group is currently developing an engagement plan for our new slogan, as well as strategies that will enhance transparency in local-government decision making processes.
